# The Spotlight Interview

This month Spotlight talks to Roger Bailey our new Chairman.

Where did you grow up? Tell us a bit about your youth and career.

I was born in Newcastle-upon-Tyne and even though I was very young when the family moved away I can still speak fluent Geordie. My formative years were spent in Solihull in the West Midlands until I joined the army at the age of seventeen. After 4 years of military service I had a wonderful few years in the Lake District before moving to Jersey in 1979. Again, after some lotus eating years (my mis-spent youth went on into my thirties) I entered the finance industry, eventually qualifying as a Chartered Secretary.

# How did you get involved in music?

At the age of 15 I found a guitar in the attic. It only had one string on it but I found that, without any assistance, I could pick out a tune on that one string. Bob Dylan and Donovan, among many others, were writing amazing songs at the time which were not difficult to play and I was swept up in it all. I bought a cheap acoustic guitar, painted it purple and off I went. Things have improved since then.

What was your first experiences of performing to the public?

Two examples are pertinent really.

At the age of 10 years old I won a talent competition with my sister Liz. We sang "We're a Couple of Swells" a la Judy Garland and Fred Astaire in front of an audience of about 300, and each won a pen set which, for a 10 year old was unimpressive.

The first place I ever played as a singer/guitarist was a floor spot at a very famous, though small, folk club called The Boggery held in a rugby clubhouse in Solihull. I was a mere seventeen year old and the man in charge was Jasper Carrott. My

performance was so bad that that was the last time I ever played there. Again, things have since improved.

When did you come to Cyprus and why?

I first came to Cyprus in August 1974 when I was in the army. I was with the UN peacekeeping force stationed on Nicosia Airport and as you can imagine I have many a tale to tell about that. This was when I fell in love with Cyprus, the people, the wildlife, the food and of course the climate. I always knew I would return and in the 1990s I did, eventually buying a property here in 2006. I was able to revisit Nicosia Airport a few years ago with a UN guide which brought back some very interesting memories.

Can you tell us the story of how you joined Harmony and Stage One?

I was having a quiet dinner in Melitzia Tavern in Tala when Harmony Choir were there having a night out. They sang Siyahamba, which I had not heard before and it sounded like what I wanted to sing. I had wanted to join a choir so I took the opportunity to talk to them. The following Tuesday I was at rehearsals at Stage One. Not long after this Stage One was into rehearsals for Fiddler On The Roof and along with other Harmony members I joined the chorus.

How have you found acting in the variety of roles you have undertaken since joining?

I had been on quite a lot of stages over the years but only as a singer/guitarist. When I joined Stage One I had never actually done any acting and I very much admire those who can act "properly". I have done some small parts in general Stage One productions but I have found a bit of a niche as a pantomime dame, and I have to say I thoroughly enjoy it. I consider it to be larking around rather than acting, directors have been very patient with me.

You have taken over as Chairman of the group at a difficult time. How do you intend to secure the future of Stage One?

It is true that Stage One is facing some very serious challenges but I think this is a normal state for an amateur dramatics club, the challenges just change with the times. I see our current challenges as twofold. Money is always an issue and we have a falling, aging membership. The committee are working on a number of plans to raise money and increase membership, particularly among younger people. I try to be a steadying influence charting a course through the issues that we face.

Do you have any ambitions to perform in any particular part or play?

The simple answer is no. I like being the pantomime dame but I am not really a theatre buff. I have attended a lot of theatre productions over the years and have been very impressed and entertained by many of them. If I had to choose a part I think it would be that of the narrator in Blood Brothers. I have seen the play a number of times (including the Stage One production) and I have to say it remains my favourite at the head of a list of many other excellent performances. Having said that, if there is ever a play based on the Peaky Blinders I would love to play Thomas Shelby!

What show would you most like to see Stage One perform?

Mamma Mia, but I think this is a pipe dream. We would certainly need some younger members.

How do you think we can attract greater audience numbers to our shows?

This is a very tough one, I don't think there is a simple answer. Increasing membership will help, as will raising awareness of the existence of Stage One Theatre. I would like to get more interest in the theatre from other communities in Cyprus who may want to become involved and I believe in being friendly with our friends, ie, liaising with other theatres and other parties interested in putting on productions, perhaps even sharing resources with them. I think I have convinced the committee that we should consider giving away a small number of tickets for each production, on quiet nights of course, to get our name out there a bit more. I have been very surprised by the number of people I have spoken to who are not aware of our existence. I hope to change this. We have, for example, developed a formal relationship with Neo's Sports Bar in Peyia, I think this sort of thing will help and I hope to do more. The sub-committee charged with selecting which plays get performed has a huge responsibility. The adage "you can't please all of the people all of the time" certainly fits here but still these decisions have to be made. From an interpersonal point of view I would like to achieve better cohesion in the theatre group, emphasising that we are all trying to go to the same destination but there are many ways of getting there and we need to work together. We are running a theatre group, not the United Nations.
